ACTIVITY	Sometimes it's hard to know how long you need to stay home when you're sick with a cold. Ask students to think about who and what might be affected if someone misses several days of school. Who might have to help them catch up? Should students have to complete every assignment they missed? Should you have to worry about catching up on work while you rest to get better? Consider solutions: Invite students to come up with ideas on how to make it easier to handle absences from being sick. If they could recommend ways to manage missed school days, what would they suggest?	Dogs are believed to have primarily descended from Asian gray wolves, sharing many traits despite looking different across species. Show students a photograph featuring nine different canines, like the one provided in this case study link. Ask students to list features common to all the animals pictured, then discuss what type of animals they think they are observing. Students will likely recognize both wolves and dogs. Next, have them categorize the animals into wolves and dogs, and consider why these species might still share many characteristics and why some features differ.

ARTICLE	"Donald Trump elected US President" (page 2)	"Earth has a temporary second moon" (page 15)
VOCABULARY	roles, officials, elected official, responsibilities	exploration, discovery, spacecraft, celestial body
ACTIVITY	The president is just one of several different levels of elected officials. Election officials can be national, state, or local. Invite students to investigate two roles close to home. Share definitions of a mayor and governor. Then, present the following roles and ask students to sort them by who would most likely be responsible. 1) There is only one in a state (G). 2) They appoint state judges (G). 3) They manage agencies, like the Department of Education (G). 4) They command the National Guard (G). 5) They represent the interests of a city at the local and state level (M). 6) They attend city celebrations and parades (M). 7) They attend and run town council meetings (M). 8) They are responsible for their city's budget (M). Have students summarize similarities and differences in the local roles they have analyzed	Have students create a T-chart and write the letters A, E, I, O, U in the left column. Explain that each letter stands for a different reflection: A is for "Adjective," E is for "Emotion," I is for "Interesting," O is for "Oh!" (something surprising), and U is for "Um?" (a question or curiosity). Share the Moon Exploration Video, pausing every minute. After each pause, ask students to reflect using the prompts: A: Write a word describing something they saw or learned. E: How did this part make them feel? I: Note something interesting. O: Record something surprising. U: Write a question or something they want to learn more about. Continue throughout the video, then have students share their thoughts and excitement about moon exploration with a partner.
