ΑCΤΙVΙΤΥ	Write the statement on the board, "It's bad manners to regift a present," and divide the class into three groups: Agree, Disagree, and Devil's Advocates. Tell the "Agree" group they should read the article looking for evidence that explains why it's bad manners to regift a present. Have the "Disagree" group look for evidence for why isn't bad manners to regift a present. Challenge the "Devil's Advocates" group to familiarize themselves with both perspectives. Facilitate a debate with the class by inviting the "Agree" group to speak for 2 minutes about their support for regifting. Then, ask the "Devil's Advocate" group to explain their position more deeply. Repeat with the "Disagree" group.	Notre-Dame is a masterpiece of Gothic architecture in France. As buildings and cathedrals across Europe became more decorative with this style, architects wanted the rain gutters to look just as fancy as the buildings. Builders started to add gargoyles to cathedral roofs as an ornate spout that helped water drain away from buildings. Invite students to use an image and hand-shape a paper-mache gargoyle. Mix a large batch of papier-mâché pulp and shred pieces of paper. Guide students to use cups as a base and then layer on the pieces of paper, sticking them with the paper-mache mixture to make a gargoyle shape. Add sand for a stone effect and paint over the finished piece once it's dry. Or spray with faux granite paint.

ACTIVITY	Readers were invited to submit cover designs for the Winter Cover Contest, showcasing their creativity and unique interpretations of the season. Guide students to view the finalists and winners and select their favorite. Ask students to share the inspiration for each design, discussing the themes, emotions, or ideas the artist may have been trying to convey. Then, ask students which cover scene they wish they could transport into and why. Encourage them to imagine the sights, sounds, and feelings they would experience in that scene. Finally, have students share their reasons for wanting to step into that specific cover with a partner and what about it resonates most with them.	Have students make a decorative gift or holiday decoration. Invite students to find '6 symbol' plastic cups that have been recycled. Or use plastic cups that have been washed after a classroom party. Tell students to draw designs all over the outside of the cup with permanent markers. Make sure they also color the bottom of the cup. Preheat an oven to 350 degrees Fahrenheit at the school, or take the cups home to melt them. Place the cups face down on a cookie sheet lined with parchment or foil. Watch the cups melt down until they are flat; this should take anywhere from 15 seconds to no more than 1 minute. Once they cool, help students punch holes in them to hang them, and use them as gift tags or other holiday decorations.
